Hugh Petter is a recognised authority on classical and traditional architecture, with broad experience that includes new buildings and alterations, extensions and repairs to historic properties, as well as design consultancy and masterplanning. Hugh is currently working with the Prince's Foundation and The Duchy of Cornwall on the masterplan and Code for a sustainable urban extension to Newquay. He is also working on a number of one-off private houses across the UK.

Hugh works across Britain, in Italy, the Caribbean, North America and Russia. He has published various articles and essays on architectural subjects and is a visiting tutor to several colleges, both in the UK and abroad.

Recent awards for Hugh's work include a UK Property Awards Best Architecture (Single Residence) Highly Commended Award in 2011 and Five Star Award in 2008; The Herald Property Award Best Luxury House in 2009 and 2011; The Georgian Group Giles Worsley Award for a New Building in a Georgian Context 2007 for a modern classical Villa in Gloucestershire, and the Palladio Award 2006 (Public Spaces: Parks, Plazas, Gardens, Streetscapes) for The Millennium Gate in Atlanta USA, the largest public art project in the States for 50 years.

Hugh is a Chartered Architect, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts, an elected Brother of the Art Workers' Guild (Chairman of the Trustees from 2006-09); an elected Member of the International College of Traditional Practitioners and the International Network for Traditional Building, Architecture and Urbanism (INTBAU); Academician, Academy of Urbanism, a member of the Council of Advisors for the Institute of Classical Architecture & Classical America (ICA&CA) in New York, and a member of the Executive Committee and Education Working Group at the Georgian Group. Hugh is currently a Governor of the Building Crafts College, an external examiner at the College of Estate Management at University of Reading

After joining Robert Adam Architects as an Associate in 1993, Hugh became a Director in 1997. He won Rome Scholarships in 1990 and 1991 before returning to London in 1992 to establish the Foundation Course at The Prince of Wales's Institute of Architecture where he served as Senior Tutor for six years. Hugh graduated with Distinction from Portsmouth School of Architecture in 1990.
